Here are three different ways we use **in** in MULTI-WORD VERBS.

1 Enter, go inside (often the opposite of **out**)



Hey Pete, come in, please

come in, drop in, go in, look in, rush in

2 Stay inside (often the opposite of **out**)



**Shall we go out for a meal?
I'd rather eat in.**

eat in, live in, settle in, stay in

3 Hand in = Deliver (to an official, a supervisor etc)



Please hand in your documents before 12 noon.

4 Give in = surrender

**If he gave in to her now he'd have to give in to her again.
Don't give in to them, however much they insist.
Scotland's top law officer, Lord Rodger, gave in to the demands of MPs.**
