Notes

There is, it is and they are

Three different meanings

1 **There is** (EXISTENCE)

We use *there is* and *there are* to say that things exist, that something (or someone) is present or happened:

There is a cafe over there; I want a coffee!

There are about 180 'safe' languages in the world.

There was a huge tsunami in Japan in 2011.

2 **It is** (IDENTIFICATION)

We use *it is* to identify someone or something:

(Knock knock) "*Who is it?*" "*It's me!*"
"*What's that?*" "*It's a leopard.*"

We use *it is* for singular and plural:

"*Who's that?*" "*It's Mike and Sue.*"

For identification, we use *it is*, not ~~I am~~ or ~~they are~~.

3 **It is and they are** (DESCRIPTION)

We also use *it is*, and *they are*, to describe people and things:

It is: for things only

They are: for things and people:

It's red.

They're Korean.

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
